

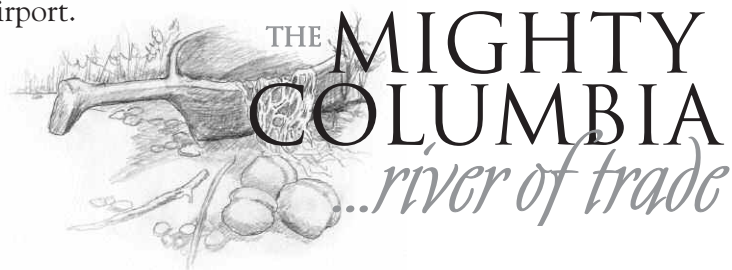

PORT OF PORTLAND

LEWIS & CLARK AT Neer-chokio

Captain William Clark of the Corps of Discovery visited the Shahala Indians in their village of Neer-chokio at 3:00 in the afternoon of April 2, 1806. The Shahalas were a Chinook-speaking people who lived along the south shore of the Columbia between the Sandy and Willamette rivers. The Columbia River was vital to the Shahala culture and economy. In this exhibit, as in his journal, you can hear Clark describe the village setting, with its canoes, two-dozen small huts, and a large lodge.

The Shahala, whose ancestors had lived along the Columbia for 10,000 years, depended on the river for fish and transportation, and upon the land for game, fruits and vegetables. They cut cedar for canoes. They collected or traded for stone, which they used for tools, food preparation, and sculptures. Nearby, they gathered plant materials from which they made clothing, baskets, and cordage. The Shahalas traded with other tribal nations along the Columbia River, from the coast to the west and up to Celilo Falls, 90 miles east from where you stand. They exchanged food, beads, furs, stone, baskets, pigments for coloring, slaves, copper, shells, and other trade goods.

Stepping into the doorway of a "large double house" at Neer-chokio, Clark describes what took place. Before you is what he might have seen inside the lodge.

Dentalium shells and glass beads
(collected from European and American (U.S.) traders) were valued for jewelry and trade. They hang here from an Indian glass shape.

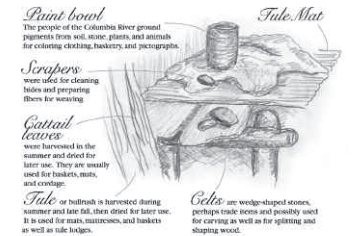




Exhibit panels showing historic views out the windows of the Pioneer Courthouse cupola

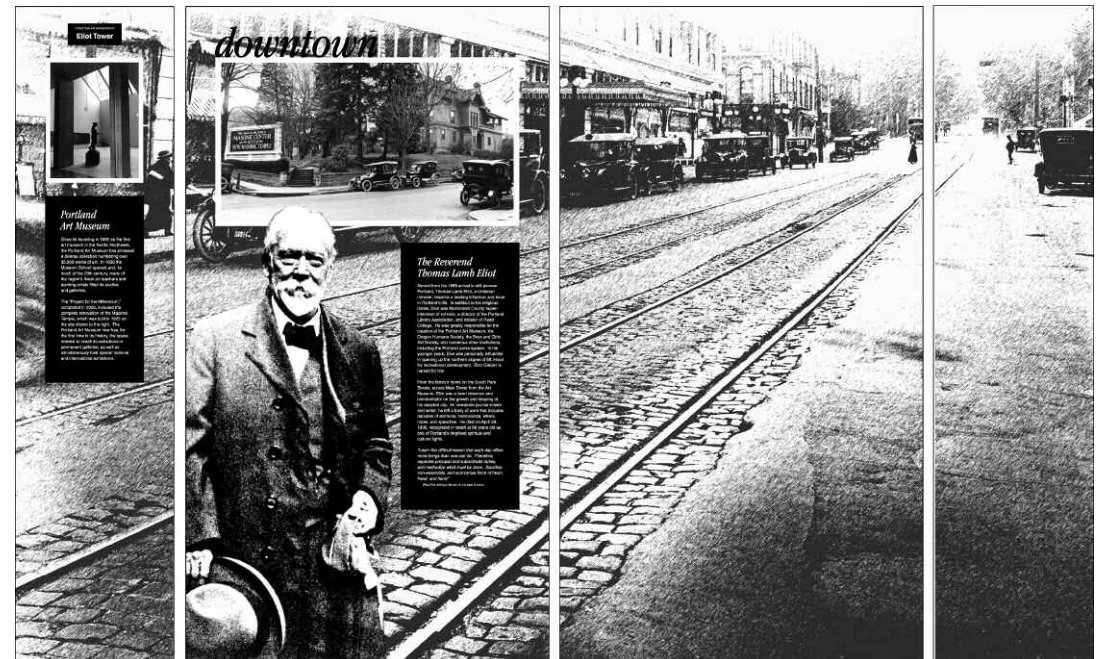
